#### **MISSION ACCOMPLISHED**

As you all know, in January of 2021 your board of directors decided to put another goal at the top of our list other than adding to our Library. I asked the board at that time what our most important asset was. It did not take long for the board to come to the decision that we can replace the buildings in case of a fire, BUT we can't replace our artifacts! So, at that time we embarked on the mission of getting a Fire Suppression System in place in all structures. One year and ten months later we are excited to let you know that our project is now complete.

Our contractors all came in at the bid quoted, or less. The Ray Wells Inc. contractor for the underground portion of the project gifted the museum back \$4,000.00 of their original bid price. The system has been inspected, tested and approved by the agencies involved. The 3' by 6' enclosure on the parking lot end of the museum was done by Ron Mann Construction, who only billed us for the actual materials and the cost of his worker's time/hr.

This project was well received by the community as is evidenced by the gift funds we received. We project that our fund-raising efforts will total \$90,000.00 and it looks as though the final cost will be about \$96,000.00.

There is a list of the donors for this project at the right side of the large donor display. Big "Thank Yous" to these folks are definitely in order, should you meet them when out and about!

As for me, I will be sleeping better, knowing the museums artifacts are now as safe as they can be.

He and his board had visions of moving the museum to Old Town and he and his board put their trust in me, to work towards that goal if the opportunity should come.

We have bought and paid for the Old Florence School for \$910,000.00 with much community help. We have joined the two buildings with city and county tourism dollars. We have put in an elevator to the second Floor, for \$135,000.00, paid for by community support. We have organized it into one of the best liked museums on the Oregon Coast with the help of great volunteers. We have just finished the installation of a Dry Fire Suppression System in the entire complex for \$95,000.00 to preserve our artifacts in case of a fire, paid for by community support.

So, I say to my best friend Bud Miles up there, with your help

from above, we together got it done! And to you Bud on a personal note, thank you for asking me to come on your board back in 2004!

### SPM CELEBRATED MAJOR GIFT DURING SEA LION CAVES' 90TH ANNIVERSARY

Sea Lion Caves celebrated their 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary at the Siuslaw Pioneer Museum on Friday, August 26.

And, though the party was for the iconic attraction's anniversary, the museum also had cause to celebrate.

Co-owners of Sea Lion Caves, represented by Steve Saubert, presented the Siuslaw Pioneer Museum with a check for \$25,000! Museum board president Del Phelps received the gift to great applause and shouts of joy, and with great public gratitude.

About 200 attendees mixed and mingled for several hours. Coast Radio KCST/KCFM broadcasted live from the event. Members of the Siuslaw Pioneer Museum board dressed in period costume to add to the flavor of the evening.

"The celebration began at 5:00 p.m. with champagne and wine for those of age, juice, cookies, and other party snacks," said Phelps. "We had a special historic exhibit dedicated to Sea Lion Caves right in the center of the museum and presentations by local dignitaries—Florence mayor Joe Henry and district 9 Oregon state representative Boomer Wright—it was a grand occasion for all," he added.

"We thank the Siuslaw Pioneer Museum for their support in hosting historic exhibits, not just of Sea Lion Caves but of the entire region's history from first-nations people through the settlers' and into modern times. They have a true community treasure that everyone should see," said Steve Saubert, one of Sea Lion Caves' co-owners. Sea Lion Caves plans to celebrate all year.

Saubert proudly introduced co-owners' family members from his grandfather (and Sea Lion Caves' cofounder) William Saubert, whose black-and-white portrait hangs on the wall of the museum's open staircase, to his wife, Sue, and two daughters and their families, who were in attendance. He also introduced Mary Jacobson, as well as attending members of

the Jacobson family which included a fifth-generation family member. Saubert also entertained attendees in a side room with a perky rendition of the ragtime classic "The Entertainer" by Scott Joplin on one of the museum's antique pianos.

Saubert and Phelps also told attendees if they contributed a financial gift to the museum's operations they would receive a family admission pass to Sea Lion Caves, good for one use during the next 12 months.

Since 1932, visitors to the area have been able to descend, first by wooden stairway, nowadays by elevator, about 200 feet from the clifftop above America's largest sea cave down into the cavernous environs of multiplied hundreds of frolicking pinnipeds including Steller and California sea lions. The entire site is designated as a national wildlife refuge for the animals and birds that live there.


